

## Michigan Poll Worker Requirements & Best Practices

- 1. Must be a Michigan Registered Voter or 16-17 years old residing in Michigan.
- 2. A Michigan voter can serve in any jurisdiction in Michigan.
- 3. While you can vote with a felony record, you cannot serve as a poll worker.
- 4. Available to work the full Election Day. Your day will begin at approximately 5:30am if serving at a polling location or 6am if serving at an Absentee Ballot Counting Board. The day runs past the closing of polls (8PM) until 9PM or later.
- 5. If you are serving at an Absentee Ballot Counting Board, you will be sequestered and not able to use your cell phone from 7am-8pm.
- 6. Complete a jurisdiction specific application once placed in a jurisdiction by the MichiganVoting team in partnership with the Secretary of State's Democracy MVP team.
- 7. Attend a training hosted by your assigned jurisdiction. Most clerks are still finalizing their training schedules. Detroit's training program will begin on 9/14.
- 8. Bring snacks, water, light meals and a phone charger with you. You will get breaks during the day, but the number of nearby restaurants varies depending on your assigned location.
- 9. Wear professional, but comfortable clothing and shoes. In Detroit, poll workers are asked to wear black or dark blue pants and shoes along with a white shirt in order to be easily identifiable as a poll worker.
